I had a couple of free hours yesterday afternoon in the Pacific Northwest.

I saw on the digital highway signs that the Hood Canal Bridge was to open at 1:45PM, so I scurried to my Hood Canal Bridge photo spot in time to catch it. Recall from my 9 SEP 2007 postcard that the East span of the bridge was being rebuilt, so I wanted to get a shot of the new span opening. I got all set up to take the shot, then at 1:44PM, a fog bank rolled in and the bridge disappeared from view, so all I got was a shot before it opened. Compare this image to the 9 SEP 2007 image to see the difference.

Then I headed down to Coyle (see map). Coyle is at the tip of a peninsula created by Hood Canal on the East and Dabob Bay on the West. It's an extremely rural area, and the Lincoln Towncar got a little muddy from the wet unpaved roads. The few locals I passed on the way eyeballed me wondering what I was doing in such an obscure place without a pickup truck.

On the way back from Coyle, the sun peeked out and I was able to get some shots. A really beautiful area.

On the return trip, I stopped before the bridge and walked down for a long shot along the road. I almost jumped out of my shorts when someone on the road leaned on their horn while I was looking through the camera viewfinder. Hope they got a good laugh.

Also is a photo taken from the ferry terminal in Kingston as the sun was setting. I met a friend (also a member of the famous postcard list) for dinner in Edmonds at the other end of the ferry last night. It pays to know people wherever you go.
